"Do not oppress an alien; you yourselves know how it feels to be aliens, because you were aliens in Egypt." Exodus 23:9

"Dear friends, I urge you as aliens and strangers in the world, to abstain from sinful desires, which war against your soul." I Peter 2:11

As I write this, the Federal government is, at least "partially", shut down. I hope that by the time you read this, it no longer is. If, for no other reason, than the unfortunate, involuntary loss (or delay) of income by folks who work for affected government agencies. My aim is to reflect, from a Biblical perspective, on the stated cause of the "shut down" – our nation's immigration policy. There is considerable disagreement in Congress and among our citizens about funding a wall on our southern border with Mexico which if built (or extended) would be part of the "enforcement of entry into our country part" of immigration policy.

My aim is not to discuss what the policies and procedures for such a complex issue as immigration ought to be – my newsletter space (according to my editors) is rather limited! The Bible does not speak to immigration policy for nation-states, much as it does not speak to other issues nations face, such as education or economic policies. But the Bible speaks on several occasions about "the alien." In the Old Testament the word translated as "alien" meant '*a person or family who leaves village or tribe because of war, famine, or "blood guilt" (fleeing a charge of murder) and seeks shelter elsewhere.* ' They would be "alien" to whatever tribe or village took them in, and likely would not enjoy all the privileges of that tribe – rights to own land, marry and participate in the administration of justice might be curtailed.

And yet, God tells Israel not to be *that kind* of "host tribe" because they, having been aliens in Egypt, knew how difficult – even miserable that could be. Not surprising, given that Israel was called into existence through Abraham and Sarah, whom God told to *'leave your country and your kin...and go to a land I will show you. I will make you a great nation*' (Genesis 12:1-2a). God's concern for the alien extended to bringing them under the Covenant of Sinai by extending to them the right of "sabbath rest" in Exodus 20:10, judicial rights (Exodus 22:11) and

even "gleaning rights" (food) in Leviticus 19:10. Israel had "borders" – land ascribed to its 12 tribes. Nevertheless, as a "great nation" Israel was to show concern even for those who had not necessarily received the God of Israel as their God. Concern for the resident alien was just one of the ways Israel was to be holy, as the Lord their God was holy.

In the New Testament, Peter uses the word "alien" to describe someone who is a sojourner or visitor, not necessarily as one who takes up long term residence. That's because he is speaking about and to Christians whose experience of living in the world, no matter where they lived, would be as folks who were just "passing through" – perpetually in a "foreign culture" of sorts. This is consistent with the view of Paul, who in Philippians 3:20 said to believers; "our citizenship is in heaven, and it is from there that we are expecting a Savior – the Lord Jesus."

The church was a collection of people of many races, cultures and religions invited into what Jesus called "the Kingdom (nation) of God." They were to transcend, insofar as they could, all economic or social standing their native cultures had afforded them and live with their highest allegiance to Christ and then, because of Christ, for one another. Mostly, they did this without the support of any established government.

What does all this mean regarding the current "government shutdown?" What I would hope for is some consensus among our leadership in Washington that folks whose livelihood comes from labor in government should not have to bear the brunt of larger policy disagreements. Of this both Old and New Testament are in concert – the worker deserves their wages. Second, to affirm the need for government as a means through which God rules in this world, and that means respect for the laws we have and the enforcement thereof. Third, that we in the church recognize that our role as citizens is shaped by images Jesus gives us. In Matthew 5 he says Christians are to be like "*a city set on a hill*" (5:14) and a "*lamp that is not hidden under a basket*" (5:15). But he also tells us to be like "*the salt of the earth*" (5:13) and in I Corinthians 5:6-9 Paul says the church is to be like "leaven" working from within to transform.

But perhaps above all, I hope we as Christians recall that *if* the Bible has a bias, if there must be a tipping between mercy and judgement, it is toward mercy and those in need of it. Immigration is a complex issue - one our nation has a right to decide for itself. Our nation should not discriminate in who we receive into our borders based on race or religion, and throughout our history I am proud that has been the case. Inside our borders and rights of citizenship many people, including our very own ancestors, have prospered and given the ability to worship freely.

God, from the time of the tower of Babel in Genesis 11, has, to say the least, had his hands full with nations, especially those that, instead of promoting God's will, try to "make a name for themselves." America is not to be confused with ancient Israel, but neither should we ever lose sight of the truth that nations who, in the words of Israel's Prophet Micah "*do justice, love kindness, and walk humbly with God*" fair well.

That soon, and very soon, we discover a way to embrace that balance regarding our immigration laws, let us pray.

FEBRUARY MISSION OF THE MONTH: YOUTH **PROJECTS**

Every year Calvary sets aside Youth Projects as a Mission of the Month to raise funds for the various programs that Every summer they set aside a week of students can participate in every year. This month we wanted to share with you what some of those programs are and how your contributions can offset the cost of these programs.

A camp experience at Camp Lutherdale

Camp Lutherdale offers a variety of options and opportunities throughout the summer. At Calvary we try to pick a time to go as a church. This year that week is July 7-12, and the theme for that week is Water Week! In addition to Bible study and worship, students will have a camp experience filled with lakefront activities like swimming, canoeing, pontoon boats, and the water slide, wet and wild camp games like kiddie pool kickball, and Water Olympics.

The cost for a camp experience at Lutherdale ranges from \$410 to \$750 for a full week and from \$215 to \$400 for a half week, depending on how early students register. In addition, some families of Calvary have more than one

student in their family going to camp.

Confirmation Camp at Camp Lutherdale

We encourage our middle school students to attend a week of confirmation camp at Camp Lutherdale. camp (this year June 16-21) for churches to bring confirmation students for an immersive week of faith and fun. Special worship centered on the sacraments, small group Bible study with your church, and much more await our students this week at camp.

The cost for a week of confirmation camp at Lutherdale ranges from \$410 to \$750 depending on how early students register.

High School Mission Trip

Every year our high school students venture to another part of the country to serve those in need. This year we are partnering with Group Mission Trips who organize mission trips across the country and around the globe. We'll be joining numerous other churches from across the country to serve the community of Pocahontas, VA. We'll repair porches, patch roofs, shore up existing structures, and serve this community where it's needed most. The registration fee per participant is \$464. This does not include our travel

costs, hotel and meals on the road. Winter Retreat at Camp Timberlee

In addition to our summer activities, the middle and high school students take time to get away at Camp Timber-lee in East Troy for a winter retreat. Students can relax and have fun with a variety of activities like broomball, tubing, tobogganing, trail rides, zipline, leathershop, escape room, indoor games, hot chocolate bar, karaoke, and more. The weekend also includes four chapel sessions featuring a fantastic speaker and worship band.

The cost per participant is \$146. Though less expensive than our summer experiences, families also have more than one student going on the winter retreat.

Calvary's generous support allows students to experience the good news of the Gospel of Jesus Christ, grow in their faith and relationships, and serve others. 

Here's the story in a nutshell: Three women set out to find eligible millionaires to marry, but find true love in the process.






