Call of a Pastor vs. ‘Hiring and Firing’

Paul, called by the will of God to be an apostle of Christ Jesus. — 1 Corinthians 1:1

Undoubtedly, I am writing these articles with an eye toward those congregations and pastors currently in the NALC Call Process. As this is one of my primary responsibilities as Assistant to the Bishop for Ministry and Ecumenism, I devote much of my time and energy to working with, listening to, and prayerfully guiding our pastors and congregations through the process.

One of the disappointments, however, in this work in the NALC is the realization that so many of our congregational leaders have little understanding of the “call” of the pastor, relying continually upon the mistaken notion that the council of the congregation “hires” their pastor. This naturally translates to the assumption that the council also has the authority to “fire” the pastor.

We could speculate upon the origin of such a mistaken understanding, but better that we simply acknowledge the reality, the harm that it does, and how we may more faithfully consider the call of the pastor, and so, the working relationship between pastor, council and congregation.

We all realize, I trust, that there are certain aspects of the calling of a pastor that relate to employment: the congregation votes to extend the call; the council, with congregational approval, is responsible for setting compensation and benefits, reporting payment of compensation to the government, etc.

We are not arguing here that there are not some

ways in which the congregation is employer and the pastor is an employee. The point being made, however, is that thinking of the pastor only as, or primarily as, an employee is detrimental to the relationship of pastor and congregation and will often lead to a deterioration in this relationship. Why?

First, the pastor, while acknowledging the aspects that have to do with "employment," understands himself or herself as called by God to this congregation. The action in the call of the pastor is first and foremost the work of God through His Holy Spirit leading and guiding the process. The congregation and the pastor are seeking God's will and once convinced that God intends for this congregation and this pastor to serve together, the congregational call indicates their acceptance of God's will.

In other words, when the congregation becomes convinced that God wants them to call *this* pastor to be their pastor, the congregational vote is an expression of "Thy will be done!" The ordination and installation rites reflect this understanding. We acknowledge, together, that the call comes from God, even as St. Paul understood his call as coming not from men but by the will of God.

This is important as the pastor must speak God's Word and God's will, even when it may make the hearers uncomfortable. When the pastor preaches God's Word, saying, "Thus says the Lord," the preacher must never say, "Thus says the Lord if it is all right with you, and you don't mind me saying it since you've hired me and I must please you." This does not provide the preacher with freedom to push his or her own agendas or wants or desires, but should free them to preach God's Word powerfully and boldly, in its fullness in both Law and Gospel.

Second, an attitude of "hiring" and "firing" the pastor is destructive to the relationship because it leads council leaders to think of themselves as "boss" of the pastor. This necessarily leads to an adversarial relationship, rather than a relationship built on trust, care and love for one another. It's in this way that we describe the pastor-congregation relationship as relational and covenantal, rather than employee employer.

I believe the marriage image helps us to appreciate this. No marriage will survive and thrive if husband or wife thinks of themselves as "boss" of the other. Together with the instruction in Ephesians 5 for the husband to be head of the wife as Christ is head of the Church, Paul also calls for husband and wife to be subject to one another out of reverence for Christ, husbands loving their wives as Christ loves the Church, wives respecting their husbands.

Paul explains that within this essential relationship within God's order of creation, there is to be mutuality, respect, honor, love and trust. What's more, however, and what is often missed, is that St. Paul concludes saying, "This is a great mystery, and I mean in reference to Christ and the Church." (Ephesians 5:32 RSV).

Just as no healthy, sane man or woman considers that they are "hiring" a spouse whom they can "boss" around, no council or congregation is well served by thinking they are "hiring" a pastor of whom they will be "the boss." Entering into a covenantal relationship of mutuality, respect, honor, love and trust will serve pastor and council well and finally will build up the Body of Christ as a whole and foster unity, harmony and peace within the congregation.

This will create a climate of health, cooperation, communication and trust from the start of the pastor/parish relationship.

May God bless our pastors and congregations in developing and modeling healthy, strong, and deepening relationships that that give glory to God as we seek to follow Jesus Christ, together, as His disciples!

Music Notes from Gene Traas

Thoughts on our National Anthem

I received an email from the interim Pastor while she was at a conference, posing the idea that I write newsletter articles concerning hymns. I pondered for a while, and my mind lightly turned to thoughts of baseball – specifically the Madison (Wisconsin) Mallards, a minor league team. I may or may not have offered to accompany/lead the “Star Spangled Banner” for the game on July 17th, and I seem to recall being thanked but.... Perhaps I dreamt the whole incident, but it brought that song to mind. So, while it’s not a hymn per se, let’s talk about “The Star-Spangled Banner.”

Where It Started

The National Anthem has been our national anthem only since 1931. It started out as a poem written in 1814, “In Defense of Fort McHenry” by Francis Scott Key, when Key was moved to write that an American flag survived a night of bombing from the British. The poem was eventually matched with a tune used for a campaign song by President John Adams many years before. The Banner has acquired a really bad reputation over the years: Warlike, jingoist, impossible to sing. I’m fairly apolitical, but I feel that losing touch with the National Anthem is part of the disintegration of our civilization, as we have moved from participants to mere spectators.

Rant imminent

There are two things that bother me about Our National Anthem:

- 1) Nowadays we let someone else “perform” it at sporting events, rather than sing it as a group/audience. All too often the performer is unprepared, resulting in forgotten or botched lyrics, and styles of ornamenting and embellishing the melody often leading me to yell “Mo-o-o-o-o-o-o” at the TV screen.
- 2) We as US citizens don’t seem to know it, or at least prefer to ignore it.

If you watch any non-US sport, be it soccer, rugby or whatever, if a nation’s anthem is struck up, the crowd from that nation sings with gusto. Does it sound great? It’s not supposed to -- but national pride is clear. End of rant.

What’s wrong here?

The politically correct have badmouthed the National Anthem for decades, and schools aren’t teaching it as far as I know, so the song and the concept are dying. Even Walt Kelly, a dyed-in-the-wool conservative, did a “Pogo” strip on the difficulty of singing “the Nationable Anthem” (his concern was over the vocal range often used, by the way, not the tune itself).

Maybe the problem is that our country is too big. Unless the Toronto Blue Jays are visiting Miller Park with a large audience of Canadian transplants, there’s little reason to get your Banner on.

So many proposed problems.

What to do?

First, the vocal range. The tune is an English drinking song, “To Anacreon in Heaven.” Pitched the way most marching bands play it (in B flat, where many bandfolk are most able to play it), the tune tops out at a high F on “land of the FFFFFFFFFF” among other places. While your garden variety soprano soloist has no problem with that note, I, for one, do. Let’s do it in A flat, making the top note E flat, a lot more reachable by most human beings. You there, in the flute section, learn the fingering for D flat.

Second, play it like a hymn. Give it some consistent tempo, not the major milking done by many celebrity vocalists. Best solo version I ever heard was by Jim Cornelison, who is employed by the Chicago Blackhawks: Straightforward, inviting, people wanted to sing along and did.

Third, will you please not get hung up on the bombs bursting in air and go read the entire text? There are more verses than “O say, can you see,” and they are brilliant poetry by Francis Scott Key. I will let you search the Internets for the full text, but let me share with you verse four:

Oh! thus be it ever, when freemen shall stand
Between their loved home and the war’s desolation!
Blest with victory and peace, may the heav’n rescued land
Praise the Power that hath made and preserved us a nation.
Then conquer we must, when our cause it is just,
And this be our motto: “In God is our trust.”
And the star-spangled banner in triumph shall wave
O’er the land of the free and the home of the brave.

There is the question of its warlike nature. Have you read the text to “La Marseillaise” (the national anthem of France)? Non? Go give that a read – I’ll wait. You’ll find ours far kinder.

So, while you’re at the Mallards game on July 17th, or at any game, sing. Steel yourself against the dirty looks of the non-singers. Glare back and sing all the louder. If you don’t know it, learn it. If we as citizens learn no other song in life, let it be this one.

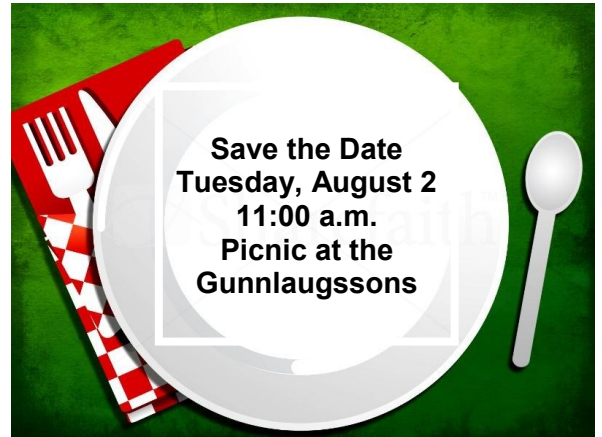

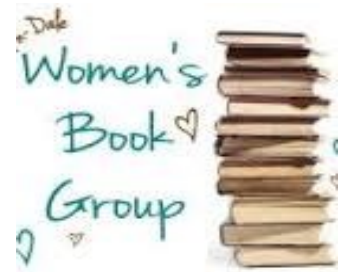
