This Week's Pondering Pastor Ken Nelson, Senior Pastor



"Yes Lord," she said, "but even the dogs eat the crumbs that fall from their master's table." Matthew 15:27

I'm a proponent of Bible memorization. A couple of verses I learned 25 years ago in Bible school that lift up the value of memorizing are Jeremiah

15:16 which says "when your words came I ate them. They were my joy and my heart's delight. For I bear your name O Lord God almighty" and Psalm 119:11 "I have hidden your word in my heart, that I might not sin against you."

Most "memory verses" in the Bible are what old-time comedians used to call "one liners" – passages that are short, to the point, and...well...memorable! I'm not sure Matthew 15:27 has made many widely circulated "Great Promises from the Bible" memory lists. It's not very likely to be up there with "*the Lord is my Shepherd, I shall not want*" or "*For God so loved the world that he gave his only son...*" or "*Go and make disciples of all nations...*"

That's understandable – Matthew 15:27 does not "stand alone" on its own quite so well as those others. It, like most of the Bible, is intended to be read in context. So for context you need to read all of our gospel lesson for this week – Matthew 15:21-28. But you'd do well to read Matthew 8:5-13 too, and then flip back and read Matthew 14:28-32 and I could go on and on giving you context for Jesus' apparent insult of a non-Jewish woman who merely asked for healing mercy for her daughter. I'll say more in my sermon on this subject, but a few comments on this passage are in order ... I'll call them "outtakes" – "ponderings" one discovers when you dig deep into what the Bible says, even if it seems perplexing or offensive.

For starters, the woman's willingness to be considered "a dog" is quite stunning, but not so very much more so than, as in Matthew 8:5-13 a Roman centurion lowering himself

to ask for Jesus to heal his servant – a request laced with quite uncharacteristic Roman humility. The woman in this story knows full well non-Jews (pagans) were considered by many, if not all Jews, to be as likely to win favor in God's eyes as a dog was.

But that doesn't deter her – and that is the beauty of this story – and makes it worthwhile memorizing this verse. None of us are worthy of a love so deep and lasting as God holds for us. For as soon as we begin to assume we are at least "good enough" to catch a little of God's favor, as soon as we start to embrace the all too common presumption (held by an astonishing number of self-identified Christians by the way) that "trying to lead a good life" is how a person might merit eternal life – then we need to

We have taken many steps to ensure as safe of an environment as possible – please use your own judgement in choosing to come. You must do what is most comfortable for you. We will also continue to offer the weekend worship materials via email, as well as delivery of home communion to any member who wishes to receive it. Please call the office at 262.786.4010 for more details or to sign up to receive home communion.

Safe practices are in place for all worship services.

Face masks are required while at worship. We will have a limited supply on hand near the entrance to the Sanctuary.

Social distancing has been established in the Sanctuary with assigned pews for each service, designated by colored tags (see photo). Please sit only in the pew with the tag designated for



that service. If you are not sitting with your family, please observe the 6' distance between you and someone next to you (approximately two arm lengths).

All high touch points such as pews and door handles are sanitized after each service. The Altar Guild follows strict sanitation practices when filling the cups. We are using hosts instead of bread and wine is "self serve". All servers will wash their hands in the Sacristy prior to serving communion.


Flowers are \$35 and may be taken home following the 10 a.m. worship on Sunday morning.
