Practice Your Righteousness in Fasting

Scripture records the fasts of numerous people and groups of people. Moses, David, Elijah, Hezekiah, Jesus, and Paul fasted (Deut. 9:9; 2 Sam. 12:16; 1 Kings 19:8; 2 Kings 18:6; Matt. 4:2; Acts

9:9). Jehoshaphat called for the nation of Israel to fast (2 Chron. 20:3). The Gentile king of Nineveh called for the whole region to fast along with their animals (Jonah 3:5). Ezra and the exiles fasted before their return to their homeland (Ezra 8:21). And, Esther and her handmaidens fasted with Mordecai and the Jews in Susa (Esther 4:16).

In Jesus' day, fasting was a form of self-humiliation meant to communicate grief, mourning, and repentance to God and neighbor. It involved more than refraining from food and drink for a set period. It also included a disregard for clothing, general hygiene, and looks; this took the form of sackcloth and ashes. And a disregard for sleep referred to as keeping vigil (Bruce J. Malina, *Social-Science Commentary on the Synoptic Gospels*, 360).

Fasting could be a voluntary or involuntary practice. Involuntary fasting happened in response to the unexpected loss of a loved one or a national tragedy which rendered one overcome with grief and to communicate to one's neighbors. On the other hand, Voluntary fasting wasn't in response to an unexpected tragedy, but rather, it was a spiritual habit. The Pharisees practiced fasting twice a week to bring Israel as a nation closer to God. Voluntary fasting was meant to communicate directly to God as a means of piety.

Beyond refraining from food, what does it mean for Christians to fast today? Christians who intentionally fast practice it

voluntarily. This means the spiritual discipline is directed to God. Jesus' words in Matthew help us understand what our attitude toward fasting and other spiritual disciplines should be. "Beware of practicing your righteousness before other people in order to be seen by them, for then you will have no reward from your Father who is in heaven (Matt. 6:1).

Jesus categorized fasting and other spiritual disciplines as practices of righteousness. Righteousness is our right-standing before God, and therefore practicing righteousness is how we live in that standing. How we do that depends on where we think our righteousness comes from. Jesus warns that those who practice righteousness for other's approval will receive just that and nothing more (Matt. 6:2, 5, 16). He says no spiritual habit, no good deed, nor any neighborly endorsement can make us righteous or enough before God. **Our enoughness before God cannot be earned by our piety or bestowed by our neighbor. Our righteousness and our justification come from Christ and His work for us.**

It is in this truth that we can fast in freedom. But, living in the enoughness of Christ proves more difficult than we often imagine. Robert Farrar Capon brings this to bear when he writes about Jesus' parable of the Pharisee and tax collector (Luke 18:9-14).

Capon argues this parable is not about taking "a humble religious stance rather than a proud one; rather it is a warning to drop all religious stances — and all moral and ethical ones, too — when you try to grasp your justification before God." It's this dropping of all religious stances that ...

brings us difficulty. We understand that the Pharisee believed he was righteous because of his works, and his neighbor's approval of them, that he practiced righteousness based on himself. We also understand that the tax collector recognized he had no righteousness of his own to speak of, but instead that he had only the righteousness and mercy of God to lean on. But, as Capon writes, "our love of justification by works is so profound that at the first opportunity we run from the strange light of grace straight back to the familiar darkness of the law."

To prove it, Capon asks the reader to imagine the tax collector back in the temple a week later. Has he improved his behavior? Did he refrain from cheating his neighbors? Did he fast or tithe, even just a little? If not, what if he returned to the temple in the same manner as the week before: eyes down, breast beaten, calling on the mercy and righteousness of God? When God sends this unimproved sinner home justified again, how do we feel? Do we, as Capon puts it, "gag on the unfairness of it?" This is the absurd and beautiful nature of the Gospel that we live in and that we practice our righteousness in, or rather, God's righteousness which is now ours in Christ Jesus. Whether we succeed or fail in fasting, our forgiveness and life don't depend on it. Because it never did.

So what is our fasting for? Or who is it for, if it's not for God or for our salvation? Why fast at all? Let's return to Jesus' words ...

Would they be adopted by a kind and loving family, or would they face a childhood and adolescence of hard labor and servitude?

February Mission of the Month - Youth Missions



The picture above is from the 2019 high school mission trip to the Virginia/West Virginia border. There, Calvary high school students joined other students from across the country to serve the local community by doing light construction work on homes in the area. They repainted houses, they tore down and rebuilt porches and wheelchair ramps, and they even recoated roofs of mobile homes.

They grew in relationships with each other, with the other students they met, and with the residents they served, most of whom are no longer able to do or afford repairs to their homes. They also spent intentional time in God's word and in worship and grew in their faith.

Every year at Calvary we set aside one of the Missions of the Month for student and youth missions. The high school mission trip is a transformative experience for the students who participate. But the cost of an average mission trip can be steep. Calvary has always tried to minimize the cost to families, but to do that takes a congregation of people willing to support students. And Calvary is one of those congregations.

The registration fee for the mission trip this year is \$468 per participant (students and adults). We ask parents to pay \$250 of that and Calvary aims to cover the rest to make it possible for as many students as possible to participate. While the fee covers food, lodging, and a myriad of other things while we're on location, the overall cost of a mission trip also includes vehicle rental, gas, hotel rooms, and meals while we travel to and from our place of service. It can cost upwards of \$8,000 to take 10 people (8 students and 2 adults) on a mission trip. This year's trip will be to Gilbert, South Carolina from June 18 - 27, 2021.

The students of Calvary are blessed to be members of a congregation that firmly believes that money should not be an obstacle for students called to serve God and their neighbors on a mission trip. As the Director of Faith Formation, I cannot thank you enough for praying for and supporting our students and providing them opportunities to grow in faith through service.

So please remember that when you give to the February Mission of the Month in support of youth missions you are providing more than an opportunity to better the lives of the individuals and communities our students serve, but providing a chance for them to grow ever closer to the God who draws them near in baptism and forgives their sins again and again through the blood of his Son.

the doors. Since the food is not donated as it was in the past, and their budget has had to incur this extra expense, they could use additional funding to purchase the food that is given out.

If you'd like to support this worthwhile cause, an easy way to do so is through your giving envelope, or online giving. Last year we forwarded \$1,345 of your generous donations to Saint Vincent de Paul - great job Calvary!



Did you know we have a food pantry collection box in the back hallway near Nicole's office? Food items (*especially the "Big 8" items*) are always needed and can be placed into the pantry box at any time.

These items are used for individuals who



stop by the church looking for food assistance. Surplus items are donated to the Waukesha Food Pantry for their distribution to the community.

Please check expiration dates on items being donated to make sure they are not past date.

The "Big 8" items most needed are:

- Canned fruits (esp. pineapple and mandarin oranges)
- Shelf stable protein (stews, tuna, chicken, spam, tofu)
- Rice brown, white and boxed mixes
- Chunky soup (ready-to-eat)
- Canned pasta with meat
- Shelf stable almond or soy milk
- Soaps, laundry detergent, toilet paper

Severe Weather Announcements

With this week's snowfall, we are reminded that weather can definitely impact traveling to church. And with that, inclement weather <u>could</u> necessitate the cancelling of worship.

In the event this should happen, you will receive an e-mail stating that the church is closed. We will also be sharing this with WISN-TV 12 and FOX6 so that it will be included in their scrolling list and on their website of closures.



The right side of the Sanctuary (as you face the altar) is equipped with a hearing loop system which transmits an audio signal directly into a hearing aid via a magnetic field. This greatly

reduces background noise, competing sounds, reverberation and other acoustic distortions that reduce clarity of sound.

Most hearing aids are equipped with a t-coil and connecting to this system is an easy switch on the hearing aid. If you need assistance during worship with this system, please reach The church office is open Monday through Friday from 8:00 a.m. until noon. The door that is closest to the office (NW



corner) will be open during those hours.

Please check in with the office staff so we know you are in the building.

We invite you to sign up for flowers to beautify our altar each weekend. The sign-up sheet for 2021 is posted on the bulletin board in the Narthex.

Flowers are \$35 and you may take them home following the 10:15 am worship on Sunday morning. If you'd prefer, you can leave the flowers at church to be enjoyed by the office staff.

If you are choosing to remain at home during the COVID-19 pandemic, any Calvary member, regardless of age or health, can request consecrated bread and juice from the weekend worship service. A sealed communion "kit", along with simple instructions to prepare you for communion, can be dropped off at your home by a member of our home communion ministry team.
