First Communion Preparation

During Lent this year, we have several students preparing to receive their First Communion on Easter Sunday. God has given parents the gift of being the greatest influence on the faith life of their children. The church's role is to partner with them as they pass on the faith to their children. One of the ways we do that is by equipping parents with the necessary resources and lessons.

First Communion preparation consists of five lessons following the questions and answers Martin Luther puts forth in his Small Catechism.

These lessons seek to help children and students learn what Holy Communion is, what its benefits are, how Holy Communion can do what it does, and who is worthy to receive Holy Communion. It also aims to teach them about various aspects surrounding Holy Communion, like the other names it is called and what other Christian traditions teach about Holy Communion.

Each lesson makes use of readings from the Bible and Martin Luther's Small Catechism, videos, important vocabulary words to know, as well as questions to reinforce and solidify learning.

In the end, we hope these resources will help parents prepare their children and determine if they are ready to receive their First Communion.

Below is a sample of what is included in the first lesson (a link to the entire first lesson is at the bottom of this article).



Lesson One: What is Holy Communion?

Things you'll need for this lesson:

- Bibles for those going through the lesson
- A copy of Luther's Small Catechism. If you don't have or can't find a physical copy, you can download the Small Catechism app in your smart device's app store or go to https://catechism.cph.org/ to view it online.
- An electronic device that can play YouTube videos. We'll be using videos from

- A pen or pencil for recording your student's ans wers at the end of the lesson

LEARNER GOAL: At the end of this lesson, students should know the basics of what Holy Communion is, by what other names it is called, its biblical and historical background, and who instituted it.

Introduction

PARENTS SAY: Holy Communion is an important part of the life of a Christian and an important part of the church as a whole. It's one of the three means of grace God uses to create and strengthen our faith, forgive our sins, and give us eternal life: the other two being Holy Baptism, and God's Word - the Bible.

Our worship service focuses on these means of grace. You can think of going through the worship service like climbing two mountains side by side. The first part of the worship service, or the first mountain, focuses on God's spoken word. We use God's words to pray to him and in our hymns and songs as we praise him. The peak of this first mountain is the Gospel reading. There we hear of what Jesus did for us. Then, we hear the pastor's sermon tell us about it again in a different way.

The second part of the service, the second mountain, focuses on God's tangible word. When something is tangible it means we can know it by touch. Holy Communion is God's word of promise that we can touch with our hands, taste with our mouths, and even smell with our noses. The peak of this second mountain is Holy Communion. That's the part of the service where we receive Jesus' body and blood under bread and wine. And, that's what these lessons will help you learn about; what Holy Communion is, what we receive when we take it, and why it's so important ...

February Mission of the Month - Youth Missions



The picture above is from the 2019 high school mission trip to the Virginia/West Virginia border. There, Calvary high school students joined other students from across the country to serve the local community by doing light construction work on homes in the area. They repainted houses, they tore down and rebuilt porches and wheelchair ramps, and they even recoated roofs of mobile homes.

They grew in relationships with each other, with the other students they met, and with the residents they served, most of whom are no longer able to do or afford repairs to their homes. They also spent intentional time in God's word and in worship and grew in their faith.

Every year at Calvary we set aside one of the Missions of the Month for student and youth missions. The high school mission trip is a transformative experience for the students who participate. But the cost of an average mission trip can be steep. Calvary has always tried to minimize the cost to families, but to do that takes a congregation of people willing to support students. And Calvary is one of those congregations.

The registration fee for the mission trip this year is \$468 per participant (students and adults). We ask parents to pay \$250 of that and Calvary aims to cover the rest to make it possible for as many students as possible to participate. While the fee covers food, lodging, and a myriad of other things while we're on location, the overall cost of a mission trip also includes vehicle rental, gas, hotel rooms, and meals while we travel to and from our place of service. It can cost upwards of \$8,000 to take 10 people (8 students and 2 adults) on a mission trip. This year's trip will be to Gilbert, South Carolina from June 18 - 27, 2021.

The students of Calvary are blessed to be members of a congregation that firmly believes that money should not be an obstacle for students called to serve God and their neighbors on a mission trip. As

the Director of Faith Formation, I cannot thank you enough for praying for and supporting our students and providing them opportunities to grow in faith through service.

So please remember that when you give to the February Mission of the Month in support of youth missions you are providing more than an opportunity to better the lives of the individuals and communities our students serve, but providing a chance for them to grow ever closer to the God who draws them near in baptism and forgives their sins again and again through the blood of his Son.

Severe Weather Announcements

With this week's snowfall, we are reminded that weather can definitely impact traveling to church. And with that, inclement weather <u>could</u> necessitate the cancelling of worship.

In the event this should happen, you will receive an e-mail stating that the church is closed. We will also be sharing this with WISN-TV 12 and FOX6 so that it will be included in their scrolling list and on their website of closures.



The right side of the Sanctuary (as you face the altar) is equipped with a hearing loop system which transmits an audio signal directly into a hearing aid via a magnetic field. This greatly

reduces background noise, competing sounds, reverberation and other acoustic distortions that reduce clarity of sound.

Most hearing aids are equipped with a t-coil and connecting to this system is an easy switch on the hearing aid. If you need assistance during worship with this system, please reach out to an usher or any staff member. The church office is open Monday through Friday from 8:00 a.m. until noon. The door that is closest to the office (NW corner) will be open



corner) will be open during those hours.

Please check in with the office staff so we know you are in the building.

We invite you to sign up for flowers to beautify our altar each weekend. The sign-up sheet for 2021 is posted on the bulletin board in the Narthex.

Flowers are \$35 and you may take them home following the 10:15 am worship on Sunday morning. If you'd prefer, you can leave the flowers at church to be enjoyed by the office staff.

If you are choosing to remain at home during the COVID-19 pandemic, any Calvary member, regardless of age or health, can request consecrated bread and juice from the



weekend worship service. A sealed communion "kit", along with simple instructions to prepare you for communion, can be dropped off at your home by a member of our home communion ministry team.
