This Week's Pondering ... Pastor Ken Nelson, Senior Pastor



"I tell you the truth", Jesus answered, "before Abraham was born, I am!" At this they picked up stones to stone him, but Jesus hid himself, slipping away from the temple grounds. John 8:58-59

The preceding verse is the culmination of a rather testy exchange between our Lord and some Jewish leaders. The whys and wherefores of the argument

center around Jesus' claim to authority, and the leaders thought he was getting a little big for his britches.

They said, "Look, who do you think you are?" If Jesus had called himself a prophet, that may have been that. If he'd said he was a man like Moses, he'd have turned heads but might have been left alone or laughed off. But our Lord went for broke so to speak – and said he was greater than Abraham, their "father". In fact, he far preceded him, all but saying his "Father" was their God! That was enough – the stones were already being foraged for and gathered up by these irate leaders to do Jesus in on the spot!

There is a profound subtlety in this text. Jesus, in referring to himself, uses a form of an absolutely unmentionable name — Yahweh. "Before Abraham was ... I AM" is an introduction of sorts, not simply a comment on parentage or age. Jesus called himself the great "I AM", the God who revealed himself to Moses on Mount Sinai in fire and in the law. But John does more than that ... well Jesus actually. In his gospel are found the "I AM" statements of our Lord — "I am the Bread of Life ... the Way, the Truth, and the Life, the Resurrection and the Life, as well as "I AM the Light of the World". In Lent, they make for particularly good promises to dwell in. These will be used in succeeding weeks as part of our introduction to Taizé worship, which our Music Director Nicole Moritz writes about in "Nicole's Notes" in this week's Connections.

I am grateful to her and our musicians for again taking on this

Taize Lenten Worship This Year

We invite you to partake of a singular contemplative prayer experience during our journey through **Lent**. We will be using Holden Prayer Around the Cross, "a flexible order for contemplative prayer . . . developed at the Holden Village retreat center in Washington state," it borrows deeply from the Taize traditions of simplicity and space for silence before God.

So what is Taize worship, then? The Taize Community is located in Burgundy, France, where an ecumenical monastic community was founded in 1940 by "Brother" Roger Schutz. During its 80-year run, it has birthed an entire tradition of prayer and music and attracted the attention of thousands of Christians (from all denominations) as a destination of pilgrimage. readily available on the internet, if you search for "Taize Community," "Taize Worship," or "Brother Roger."

The introduction describes it as "evening services that include scripture readings, prayers, silence, and an opportunity to kneel or sit near a large cross, light a candle, and pray.. Because these services take place in near darkness, the music used is simple and easily learned without the aid of printed resources. Eyes are closed or focused on the flickering candles at the cross; worshipers are free from the need to follow notes and words on a page. Short songs and brief refrains are sung repeatedly as the gathered community meditates on a simple phrase that serves to focus and facilitate prayer."

What should you expect? An opportunity to step back from life's busy rhythms, to be quiet and still before God, to wait on His voice, and to bring our own thoughts, praise, and petitions to Him - a deeply meaningful experience in your walk with God. The music is simple, mostly familiar and repetitive, allowing your mind to lift away from harsher realities and focus on the peace of Christ. 

Monday, February 22 – 9:30 a.m.



Would they be adopted by a kind and loving family, or would they face a childhood and adolescence of hard labor and servitude?

February Mission of the Month - Youth Missions



The picture above is from the 2019 high school mission trip to the Virginia/West Virginia border. There, Calvary high school students joined other students from across the country to serve the local community by doing light construction work on homes in the area. They repainted houses, they tore down and rebuilt porches and wheelchair ramps, and they even recoated roofs of mobile homes.

They grew in relationships with each other, with the other students they met, and with the residents they served, most of whom are no longer able to do or afford repairs to their homes. They also spent intentional time in God's word and in worship and grew in their faith.

Every year at Calvary we set aside one of the Missions of the Month for student and youth missions. The high school mission trip is a transformative experience for the students who participate. But the cost of an average mission trip can be steep. Calvary has always tried to minimize the cost to families, but to do that takes a congregation of people willing to support students. And Calvary is one of those congregations.

The registration fee for the mission trip this year is \$468 per participant (students and adults). We ask parents to pay \$250 of that and Calvary aims to cover the rest to make it possible for as many students as possible to participate. While the fee covers food, lodging, and a myriad of other things while we're on location, the overall cost of a mission trip also includes vehicle rental, gas, hotel rooms, and meals while we travel to and from our place of service. It can cost upwards of \$8,000 to take 10 people (8 students and 2 adults) on a mission trip. This year's trip will be to Gilbert, South Carolina from June 18 - 27, 2021.

The students of Calvary are blessed to be members of a congregation that firmly believes that money should not be an obstacle for students called to serve God and their neighbors on a mission trip. As the Director of Faith Formation, I cannot thank you enough for praying for and supporting our students and providing them opportunities to grow in faith through service.

So please remember that when you give to the February Mission of the Month in support of youth missions you are providing more than an opportunity to better the lives of the individuals and communities our students serve, but providing a chance for them to grow ever closer to the God who draws them near in baptism and forgives their sins again and again through the blood of his Son.

These items are used for individuals who stop by the church looking for food assistance. Surplus items are donated to the Waukesha Food Pantry for their distribution to the community.

Please check expiration dates on items being donated to make sure they are not past date.



The "Big 8" items most needed are:

- Canned fruits (esp. pineapple and mandarin oranges)
- Shelf stable protein (stews, tuna, chicken, spam, tofu)
- Rice brown, white and boxed mixes
- Chunky soup (ready-to-eat)
- Canned pasta with meat
- Shelf stable almond or soy milk
- Soaps, laundry detergent, toilet paper

A few reminders



Severe Weather Announcements

With this week's snowfall, we are reminded that weather can definitely impact traveling to church. And with that, inclement weather could necessitate the cancelling of worship.

In the event this should happen, you will receive an e-mail stating that the church is closed. We will also be sharing this with WISN-TV 12 and FOX6 so that it will be included in their scrolling list and on their website of closures.



The right side of the Sanctuary (as you face the altar) is equipped with a hearing loop system which transmits an audio signal directly into a hearing aid via a magnetic field. This greatly

reduces background noise, competing sounds, reverberation and other acoustic distortions that reduce clarity of sound.

The church office is open Monday through Friday from 8:00 a.m. until noon. The door that is closest to the office (NW



corner) will be open during those hours.

Please check in with the office staff so we know you are in the building.

Most hearing aids are equipped with a t-coil and connecting to this system is an easy switch on the hearing aid. If you need assistance during worship with this system, please reach out to an usher or any staff member.

A sealed communion "kit", along with simple instructions to prepare you for communion, can be dropped off at your home by a member of our home communion ministry team.
